To the Governing Board

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities and discretely presented component units of Bluefield State College (the "College") as of June 30, 2009 and 2008 and for the years then ended which collectively comprise the College's basic financial statements, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the College's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We did not audit the discretely presented financial statements of The Bluefield State College Foundation, Inc. (a component unit of the College) for 2009 and 2008 or the Bluefield State College Research & Development Corporation for 2008 (a component unit of the College). Those statements were audited by other auditors whose reports have been furnished to us, and our opinion, insofar as it relates to the discretely presented financial statements of The Bluefield State College Foundation, Inc. and the Bluefield State College Research & Development Corporation is based solely on the reports of the other auditors.

We conducted our audits in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. The financial statements of The Bluefield State College Foundation, Inc. which were audited by other auditors, were not audited in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. An audit includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements, assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, based on our audits and the reports of the other auditors, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the business-type activities and the discretely presented component units of the College as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, and the respective changes in net assets and cash flows thereof for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Years Ended June 30, 2009 and 2008

Our discussion and analysis of Bluefield State College's (the College) financial performance provides an overview of the College's financial activities during the years ended June 30, 2009, 2008 and 2007. Since this discussion and analysis is designed to focus on current activities, resulting changes, and currently known facts, please refer to the College's basic financial statements on pages 14 to 21 and the notes to financial statements on pages 22 to 65.

During the fiscal year 2003 the College adopted Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 39, *Determining Whether Certain Organizations are Component Units*, and an amendment to GASB Statement No. 14. As a result, the audited financial statements of the Bluefield State College Foundation, Incorporated (the "Foundation") are presented here with the College's financial statements for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008. For the year ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, the College determined that the Bluefield State College Research and Development Corporation (Corporation) resources became significant and required presentation in accordance with the GASB statements. The Foundation and the Corporation are private nonprofit organizations that reports under Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) standards, including FASB Statement No. 117, *Financial Reporting for Not-for-Profit Organizations*. As such, certain revenue recognition criteria and presentation features are different from GASB revenue recognition criteria and presentation features. No modifications have been made to the Foundation's audited financial information as it is presented herein.

Financial Highlights from Bluefield State College

The following are brief summaries for the College:

- The College's assets exceeded its liabilities at the end of fiscal year 2009 by \$16.3 million, compared to \$16.3 million in 2008 and \$15.0 million in 2007.
- The College increased capital assets by \$.1 million in 2009, to \$11.3 million.

Overview of the Financial Statements

The College has implemented GASB Statement No. 35, *Basic Financial Statements and Management's Discussion and Analysis for Public Colleges and Universities* beginning with fiscal year 2003. GASB No. 35 requires the College to present financial information as a whole rather than focusing on individual funds. Two major changes in the last four years are the recording of depreciation for capital assets and reclassifying certain loan program equity balances as liabilities. In addition, federal and state loan and grant programs are no longer reported as revenues and expenses in the financial statements since the transactions are directly with the student receiving the loan or grant.

This report consists of management's discussion and analysis, the basic financial statements, and the notes to the financial statements. The basic financial statements include the statement of net assets; statement of revenues, expenses, changes in net assets; and statement of cash flows.

The statement of net assets presents the College's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Increases or decreases in net assets can be an indicator of improvement or deterioration of the College's financial position.

Changes in net assets during the year are reported in the statement of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets. All revenues, expenses, and changes are reported as the underlying event occurs that results in the revenue, expense, or change. The statement of cash flows presents information on actual cash inflows or outflows as they occur.

Financial Analysis of the College

Of the College's net assets of \$16.3 million, \$11.3 million (69%) represents its investment in capital assets of land, land improvements, buildings, equipment, and library books. These capital assets are utilized to provide educational and related services to students and the communities and are not available for future spending. Unrestricted net assets are available to meet the College's obligations. The unrestricted net assets represented \$4.1 million (25%) of net assets. The unrestricted cash represents the amount not restricted via plant operations, auxiliaries, grant and loan funds, and state code restrictions.

The College's net assets from 2008 to 2009 remained relatively unchanged.







Statement of Cash Flows
Years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008

The Statement of Cash Flows presents detailed information about the cash activities of Bluefield State College during the year. The statement is divided into five parts. The first section deals with operating cash flows and shows the net cash used in the operating activities. The second section reflects cash flows from noncapital financing activities. This section reflects the cash received and spent for nonoperating, noninvesting, and noncapital financing purposes. The third section deals with the cash flows from capital and related financing activities. This section deals with the cash used for the acquisition and construction of capital assets and related items and related funding received. The fourth section reflects the cash flows from investing activities and shows interest received from investing activities. The fifth section reconciles the net cash used in operating activities to the operating loss reflected in the Statement of Revenues, Expenses and Changes in Net Assets. Cash and cash equivalents increased by \$0.7 million for the year ended June 30, 2009 of which \$1.2 million in capital asset purchases occurred.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

The debt service obligation payable to the Commission for Bluefield State College for the years ended June 30, 2009, 2008, and 2007 were \$55,510, \$76,837 and \$97,398.

There were minor changes in capital assets for year ending June 30, 2009. The following is a brief summary of capital assets activity for the College as a whole:

- No land purchases occurred during fiscal year 2009.
- Construction in progress (CIP) increased by \$731,068 for: boiler replacements in Harris Jefferson Student Center, Ned Shott Physical Education Building, and Hardway Library of \$514,611; Mahood Hall design of \$164,457; Ned Shott Physical Education Building first floor design HVAC of \$8,650; Basic Science and Dickason Hall Fire Alarm design of \$33,850; and Campus Access Road of \$9,500. Construction in progress decreased by \$174,930 for projects moved to building improvements (\$148,189) and land improvements (\$27,740).

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- Land improvements increased by \$52,690 with replacement of poles of \$35,220, and phase II landscaping of \$17,470.
- Buildings increased by \$228,190 which represented new fire alarm system in the Harris Jefferson Student Center of \$67,156, water line relocation in Dickason Hall, Ned Shott Physical Education Building, and Harris Jefferson Student Center of \$161,034.
- Equipment increased by \$393,559 with the addition of three vehicles and one van (\$78,599); Tandberg 6000mxp video system (\$26,575); two studio camera packages and accessories (\$25,540); and various network servers and other equipment. Equipment disposals of \$873,048 cost, less depreciation of \$846,089 which shows net amount of \$26,959 loss on disposal of older, unused equipment and old equipment that could not be located that had little or no value remaining.
- Library book purchases of \$6,452 and disposals of \$12,744.
- Depreciation expense was \$1,050,632, an increase of \$181,939 over 2008 which was \$868,693.

Economic Outlook

The College's overall financial position continues to be strong. The College continues to be adaptive to change and is cognizant of the national economic picture.

Recently voted the #1 College in the area by the Bluefield Daily Telegraph, employers continue to recruit many of our graduates. The quality of the education earned at Bluefield State College earns the graduates good jobs with income on average higher than several other higher education institutions in the State of West Virginia.

With the national economy continuing to be challenging, Bluefield State College continues also to be mindful of our students, keeping tuition at the level lowest in the State for baccalaureate institutions, and competitive in nearby Virginia counties.

NOTE 1 - ORGANIZATION

Bluefield State College (the “College”) is governed by the Bluefield State College Board of Governors (the “Board”). The Board was established by Senate Bill 653 (“S.B. 653”).

Powers and duties of the Board include, but are not limited to, the power to determine, control, supervise and manage the financial, business and educational policies and affairs of the institution(s) under its jurisdiction, the duty to develop a master plan for the institution, the power to prescribe the specific functions and institution’s budget request, the duty to review at least every five years all academic programs offered at the institution and the power to fix tuition and other fees for the different classes or categories of students enrolled at its institution.

S.B. 653 also created the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission (the “Commission”), which is responsible for developing, gaining consensus around and overseeing the implementation and development of a higher education public policy agenda.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the College have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (“GASB”), including Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements - and Management’s Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments*, and Statement No. 35, *Basic Financial Statements - and Management’s Discussion and Analysis - for Public Colleges and Universities* (an Amendment of GASB State No. 34). The financial statement presentation required by GASB Statements No. 34 and No. 35 provides a comprehensive, entity-wide perspective of the College’s assets, liabilities, net assets, revenues, expenses, changes in net assets and cash flows.

The College follows all GASB pronouncements as well as Financial Accounting Standards Board (“FASB”) Statements and Interpretations, Accounting Principles Board Opinions and Accounting Research Bulletins issued on or before November 30, 1989, and has elected not to apply the FASB Statements and Interpretations issued after November 30, 1989, to its financial statements.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Reporting Entity - The College is an operating unit of the West Virginia Higher Education Fund and represents separate funds of the State of West Virginia (the "State") that are not included in the State's general fund. The College is a separate entity, which along with all State institutions of higher education, the Commission (which includes West Virginia Network for Educational Telecomputing), and West Virginia Council for Community and Technical Education form the Higher Education Fund of the State. The Higher Education Fund is considered a component unit of the State, and its financial statements are discretely presented in the State's comprehensive annual financial report.

The basic criteria for inclusion in the accompanying financial statements is the exercise of oversight responsibility derived from the College's ability to significantly influence operations and accountability for fiscal matters of related entities.

As of July 1, 2003, the College adopted GASB Statement No. 39, *Determining Whether Certain Organizations are Component Units*, an amendment to GASB Statement No. 14. As a result, the audited financial statements of The Bluefield State College Foundation, Incorporated (the "Foundation") are presented as a discrete component unit with the College's financial statements for the fiscal years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008. The Foundation is a private nonprofit organization that reports under FASB standards, including FASB Statement No. 117, *Financial Reporting for Not-for-Profit Organizations*. As such, certain revenue recognition criteria and presentation features are different from GASB revenue recognition criteria and presentation features. No modifications have been made to the Foundation's audited financial information as it is presented herein except that in accordance with governmental accounting standards, the Foundation's statements of cash flows are not presented.

As of July 1, 2007, the Bluefield State College Research and Development Corporation (Research Corporation) became a material component unit and for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008 are presented as a discrete component unit with the College's financial statements. The Research Corporation is a private nonprofit organization that reports under FASB standards, including FASB Statement No. 117, *Financial Reporting for Not-for-Profit Organizations*. As such, certain revenue recognition criteria and presentation features are different from GASB revenue recognition criteria and presentation features. No modifications have been made to the Research Corporation's audited financial information as it is presented herein except that in accordance with governmental accounting standards, the Research Corporation's statements of cash flows are not presented.

The Center for Applied Research and Technology of Bluefield State College and the Bluefield State College Alumni Association are not part of the College reporting entity and are not included in the accompanying financial statements as the College has no ability to designate management, cannot significantly influence operations of the entity and is not accountable for the fiscal matters of the entity under GASB Statement No. 14, *The Financial Reporting Entity* and/or because they are not significant under GASB Statement No. 39.

Financial Statement Presentation - GASB Statement No. 35 and No. 38 establish standards for external financial reporting for public colleges and universities and require that financial statements be presented on a basis to focus on the College as a whole. Net assets are classified into four categories according to external donor restrictions or availability of assets for satisfaction of College obligations. The College's net assets are classified as follows:

- ***Invested in capital assets-net of related debt*** - This represents the College's total investment in capital assets, net of outstanding debt obligations related to those capital assets. To the extent debt has been incurred but not yet expended for capital assets, such amounts are not included as a component of invested in capital assets, net of related debt.
- ***Restricted net assets, expendable*** - This includes resources in which the College is legally or contractually obligated to spend resources in accordance with restrictions imposed by external third parties.

The West Virginia State Legislature, as a regulatory body outside the reporting entity, has restricted the use of certain funds by Article 10, *Fees and Other Money Collected as State Institutions of Higher Education* of the West Virginia State Code. House Bill 101 passed in March 2004 simplified the tuition and fee structure and removed the restrictions but included designations associated with auxiliary and capital items. These activities are fundamental to the normal ongoing operations of the institution. These restrictions are subject to change by future actions of the State Legislature.

- ***Restricted net assets, nonexpendable*** - This includes endowment and similar type funds in which donors or other outside sources have stipulated, as a condition of the gift instrument, that the principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may either be expended or added to principal.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

- ***Unrestricted net assets*** – Unrestricted net assets include resources that are not subject to externally imposed stipulations. Such resources are derived from tuition and fees (not restricted as to use), state appropriations, sales and services of educational activities and auxiliary enterprises. Unrestricted net assets are used for transactions related to the educational and general operations of the College and may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Governors.

Basis of Accounting - For financial reporting purposes, the College is considered a special-purpose government engaged only in business-type activities. Accordingly, the College's financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting with a flow of economic resources measurement focus. Revenues are reported when earned and expenditures when materials or services are received. All intercompany accounts and transactions have been eliminated.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - For purposes of the statements of net assets, the College considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Cash and cash equivalents balances on deposit with the State of West Virginia Treasurer's Office (the "State Treasurer") are pooled by the State Treasurer with other available funds of the State for investment purposes by the West Virginia Board of Treasury Investments (the "BTI"). These funds are transferred to the BTI and the BTI is directed by the State Treasurer to invest the funds in specific external investment pools in accordance with West Virginia code, policies set by the BTI, and by provisions of bond indentures and trust agreements, when applicable. Balances in the investment pools are recorded at fair value or amortized cost which approximates fair value. Fair value is determined by a third-party pricing service based on asset portfolio pricing models and other sources, in accordance with GASB Statement No. 31, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Investments for External Investment Pools*. The BTI was established by the State Legislature and is subject to oversight by the State Legislature. Fair value and investment income are allocated to participants in the pools based upon the funds that have been invested. The amounts on deposit are available for immediate withdrawal or on the first day of each month for the WV Short Term Bond Pool (formerly Enhanced Yield Pool) and, accordingly, are presented as cash and cash equivalents in the accompanying combined financial statements.

The BTI maintains the Consolidated Fund which consists of seven investment pools and participant-directed accounts, three of which the College may invest in. These pools have been structured as multiparticipant variable net asset funds to reduce risk and offer investment liquidity diversification to the Fund participants. Funds not required to meet immediate disbursement needs are invested for longer periods. A more detailed discussion of the BTI's investment operations pool can be found in its annual report. A copy of the annual report can be obtained from the following address: 1900 Kanawha Boulevard East, Room E-122, Charleston, WV 25305 or <http://www.wvbt.com>.

Permissible investments for all agencies include those guaranteed by the United States of America, its agencies and instrumentalities (U.S. Government obligations); corporate debt obligations, including commercial paper, which meet certain ratings; certain money market funds; repurchase agreements; reverse repurchase agreements; asset-backed securities; certificate of deposit; state and local government securities (SLGS); and other investments. Other investments consist primarily of investments in accordance with the Linked Deposit Program, a program using financial institutions in West Virginia to obtain certificates of deposit, loans approved by the legislature and any other program investments authorized by the legislature.

Allowance for Doubtful Accounts - It is the College's policy to provide for future losses on uncollectible accounts, contracts, grants and loans receivable based on an evaluation of the underlying account, contract, grant and loan balances, the historical collectibility experienced by the College on such balances and such other factors which, in the College's judgment, require consideration in estimating doubtful accounts.

Inventories - Inventories are stated at the lower-of-cost or market, cost being determined on the first-in, first-out method.

Noncurrent Cash and Cash Equivalents - Cash that is (1) externally restricted to make debt service payments, long-term loans to students or to maintain sinking or reserve funds, (2) to purchase capital or other noncurrent assets and (3) permanently restricted net assets, is classified as a noncurrent asset in the statements of net assets.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Investments - Investments are recorded at fair value. The College's investments were on deposit with First Community Bank, Inc. and First Century Bank, Inc. These funds represented the George M. Cruise Endowed Chair of Health Sciences/Nursing and the James H. Shott Endowed Chair of Business, respectively. Funds on deposit were invested in Federal Agency Bonds, money market funds, the underlying securities of which were securities of the U.S. Government, Federated Prime Value Obligation Funds, equity market funds, fixed income securities, and other mutual funds invested in high-quality fixed income securities. These funds were classified as long-term due to the restrictions.

Capital Assets - Capital assets include property, plant and equipment, books and materials that are part of a catalogued library and infrastructure assets. Capital assets are stated at cost at the date of acquisition or construction, or fair market value at the date of donation in the case of gifts. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets, generally 20 to 50 years for buildings and infrastructure, 20 years for land improvements, 7 years for library books and 3 to 10 years for furniture and equipment. The College's capitalization threshold is \$5,000. There was no interest capitalized during 2009 or 2008. The accompanying combined financial statements reflect all adjustments required by GASB Statement No. 42, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Impairment of Capital Assets and for Insurance Recoveries*.

Deferred Revenue - Revenues for programs or activities to be conducted primarily in the next fiscal year are classified as deferred revenue, including items such as orientation fees and room and board. Financial aid and other deposits are separately classified as deposits.

Compensated Absences and Other Post Employment Benefits - The College accounts for compensated absences in accordance with the provisions of GASB Statement No. 16, *Accounting for Compensated Absences*.

The College's full-time employees earn up to two vacation leave days for each month of service and are entitled to compensation for accumulated, unpaid vacation leave upon termination. Full-time employees also earn 1 ½ sick leave days for each month of service and are entitled to extend their health or life insurance coverage upon retirement in lieu of accumulated, unpaid sick leave. Generally, two days of accrued sick leave extend health insurance for one month of single coverage and three days extend health insurance for one month of family coverage. For employees hired after 1988, the employee shares in the cost of the extended benefit coverage to the extent of 50% of the premium required for the extended coverage. Employees hired July 1, 2001, or later will no longer receive sick leave credit toward insurance premiums when they retire. The liability is now provided for under the multiple employer cost-sharing plan sponsored by the State.

Certain faculty employees (generally those with less than a 12 month contract) earn a similar extended health or life insurance coverage retirement benefit based on years of service. Generally 3 1/3 years of teaching service extend health insurance for one year of single coverage and five years extend health insurance for one year of family coverage. The same hire date mentioned above applies to coverage for faculty employees also. Faculty hired after July 1, 2009 will no longer receive years of service credit toward insurance premiums when they retire.

The estimated expense incurred for the vacation leave or OPEB benefits are recorded as a component of benefits expense on the statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets.

Effective July 1, 2007, the College adopted GASB Statement No. 45, *Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other than Pensions*. This statement provided standards for the measurement, recognition, and display of other postemployment benefit (“OPEB”) expenditures, assets, and liabilities, including applicable note disclosures and required supplementary information. During fiscal year 2006, House Bill No. 4654 was established to create a trust fund for postemployment benefits for the State of West Virginia (the “State”). Effective July 1, 2007, the College was required to participate in this multiple employer cost-sharing plan, the West Virginia Retiree Health Benefit Trust Fund sponsored by the State of West Virginia. The Plan provides the following retiree group insurance coverage to participants: medical and prescription drug coverage through a self-insured preferred provider benefit (PPB) plan and through external managed care organizations (MCOs), basic group life, accidental death, and prescription drug coverage for retired employees of the State and various related State and non-State agencies and their dependents. Details regarding this plan can be obtained by contacting Public Employees Insurance Agency (“PEIA”), State Capitol Complex, Building 5, Room 1001, 1900 Kanawha Boulevard, East, Charleston WV 25305-0710 or <http://www.wvpeia.com>.

These statements require entities to accrue for employees’ rights to receive compensation for vacation leave or payments in lieu of accrued vacation or sick leave, as such benefits are earned and payment becomes probable.

Risk Management - The State’s Board of Risk and Insurance Management (“BRIM”) provides general, property and casualty, and medical malpractice liability coverage to the College and its employees. Such coverage may be provided to the College by BRIM through self-insurance programs maintained by BRIM or policies underwritten by BRIM that may involve experience-related premiums or adjustments to BRIM.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

BRIM engages an independent actuary to assist in the determination of its premiums so as to minimize the likelihood of premium adjustments to the College or other participants in BRIM's insurance programs. As a result, management does not expect significant differences between the premiums the College is currently charged by BRIM and the ultimate cost of that insurance based on the College's actual loss experience. In the event such differences arise between estimated premiums currently charged by BRIM to the College and the College's ultimate actual loss experience, the difference will be recorded, as the change in estimate becomes known.

In addition, through its participation in the West Virginia Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA) and a third-party insurer, the College has obtained health, life, prescription drug coverage, and coverage for job related injuries for its employees. In exchange for payment of premiums PEIA and the third-party insurer, the College has transferred its risks related to health, life, prescription drug coverage, and job related injuries.

West Virginia has a single private insurance company, BrickStreet Insurance, which provides workers' compensation coverage to all employers in the state. Other private insurance companies began to offer coverage to the private-sector employers beginning July 1, 2008 and can begin to offer to government employers July 1, 2012. Nearly every employer in the State, who has a payroll must have coverage. The cost of all coverage is paid by the employers. BrickStreet retains the risk related to the compensation of injured employees under the program.

Classification of Revenues - The College has classified its revenues as either operating or nonoperating revenues according to the following criteria:

- **Operating revenues** - Operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of exchange transactions, such as (1) student tuition and fees, net of scholarship discounts and allowances, (2) sales and services of auxiliary enterprises, net of scholarship discounts and allowances, (3) most federal, state, local, and nongovernmental grants and contracts, and (4) sales and services of educational activities.
- **Nonoperating revenues** - Nonoperating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of non-exchange transactions, such as gifts and contributions, and other revenues that are defined as nonoperating revenues by GASB Statement No. 9, *Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Governmental Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting* and GASB Statement No. 34, such as state appropriations and investment income.
- **Other Revenue** - Other revenues consist primarily of capital grants and gifts.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Use of Restricted Net Assets - The College has not adopted a formal policy regarding whether to first apply restricted or unrestricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net assets are available. Generally, the College attempts to utilize restricted net assets first when practicable.

Federal Financial Assistance Programs - The College makes loans to students under the Federal Direct Student Loan Program. Under this program, the U.S. Department of Education makes interest subsidized and nonsubsidized loans directly to students, through universities like the College. Direct student loan receivables are not included in the College's statement of net assets as the loans are repayable directly to the U.S. Department of Education. In 2009 and 2008 respectively, the College received and disbursed approximately \$7.5 million and \$6.3 million, under the Federal Direct Student Loan Program on behalf of the U.S. Department of Education, which is not included as revenue and expense on the statements of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets.

The College also distributes other student financial assistance funds on behalf of the federal government to students under the federal Pell Grant, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant, Smart, ACG and Federal Work Study programs. The activity of these programs is recorded in the accompanying financial statements. In 2009 and 2008, the College received and disbursed approximately \$4.0 million and \$3.6 million, respectively, under these federal student aid programs.

Scholarship Allowances - Student tuition and fee revenues, and certain other revenues from students, are reported net of scholarship allowances in the statements of revenues, expenses and changes in net assets. Scholarship allowances are the difference between the stated charge for goods and services provided by the College, and the amount that is paid by students and/or third parties making payments on the student's behalf.

Financial aid to students is reported in the financial statements under the alternative method as prescribed by the National Association of College and College Business Officers ("NACUBO"). Certain aid such as loans, funds provided to students as awarded by third parties, and Federal Direct Lending is accounted for as a third party payment (credited to the student's account as if the student made the payment). All other aid is reflected in the financial statements as operating expenses, or scholarship allowances, which reduce revenues. The amount reported as operating expense represents the portion of aid that was provided to the student in the form of cash. Scholarship allowances represent the portion of aid provided to the student in the form of reduced tuition. Under the alternative method, these amounts are computed on a College basis by allocating the cash payments to students, excluding payments for services, on the ratio of total aid to the aid not considered to be third party aid.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Government Grants and Contracts - Government grants and contracts normally provide for the recovery of direct and indirect costs, subject to audit. The College recognizes revenue associated with direct costs as the related costs are incurred. Recovery of related indirect costs is generally recorded at fixed rates negotiated for a period of one to five years.

Income Taxes - The College is exempt from income taxes, except for unrelated business income, as a governmental instrumentality under federal income tax laws and regulations of the Internal Revenue Service as described in Section 115 of the Internal Revenue Code.

Cash Flows - Any cash and cash equivalents escrowed, restricted for noncurrent assets or in funded reserves have not been included as cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of the statements of cash flows.

Use of Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Risk and Uncertainties - Investments are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit and overall market volatility. Due to the level of risk associated with certain securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in risk and values will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the combined financial statements.

Newly Adopted Statements Issued by the GASB - During 2009, the College adopted GASB Statement No. 49, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pollution Remediation Obligations*, as required. The adoption of this statement had no significant impact on the financial statements.

During 2009, the GASB issued GASB Statement No. 55, *The Hierarchy of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles for State and Local Governments*. This statement identifies the sources of accounting principles and provides the framework for selecting the principles used in the preparation of financial statements of state and local governmental entities that are presented in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The College adopted GASB Statement No. 55 upon issuance. The adoption of this statement had no significant impact on the financial statements.

During 2009, the GASB also issued GASB Statement No. 56, *Codification of Accounting and Financial Reporting Guidance Contained in the AICPA Statements on Auditing Standards*. This statement establishes accounting and financial reporting standards for related party transactions, subsequent events, and going concern considerations. The College adopted GASB Statement No. 56 upon issuance. The adoption of this statement had no significant impact on the financial statements.

Recent Statements Issued By the GASB - The GASB has issued Statement No. 51, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Intangible Assets*, effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2009. This statement provides guidance regarding whether and when intangible assets should be considered capital assets for financial reporting purposes. The College has not yet determined the effect that the adoption of GASB Statement No. 51 may have on the accompanying combined financial statements.

The GASB has issued Statement No. 53, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Derivative Instruments*, effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2009. This statement requires governmental entities to measure most derivative instruments at fair value as assets or liabilities. It also improves disclosure requirements surrounding the entity's derivative instrument activity, its objectives for entering into the derivative instrument, and the instrument's significant terms and risks. The College has not yet determined the effect that the adoption of GASB Statement No. 53 may have on the accompanying combined financial statements.

Reclassification - Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2008 financial statements to conform to the 2009 classifications. Revenues from Pell grants in the amount of \$3,313,571 were transferred from operating revenues to nonoperating revenues.

Cash held by the State Treasurer and cash in bank include for years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008 respectively, \$2,509,681 and \$2,963,429 of restricted cash for specific purposes by West Virginia State Code, grant resources and loan funds.

Bank balances are insured by federal deposit insurance up to \$250,000 per financial institution. Balances in these accounts sometimes exceed the federal deposit insurance limits; however, management believes the banks to be creditworthy and believes that credit risk associated with these deposits is minimal. At June 30, 2009 and 2008 respectively, total bank balances exceeded federal deposit insurance by \$651,613 and \$306,168.

Amounts with the State Treasurer and the Municipal Bond Commission as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, are comprised of the following investment pools which are subject to the following BTI policies.

NOTE 3 - CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS (Continued)

The BTI has adopted an investment policy in accordance with the “Uniform Prudent Investor Act.” The “prudent investor rule” guides those with responsibility for investing the money for others. Such fiduciaries must act as a prudent person would be expected to act, with discretion and intelligence, to seek reasonable income; preserve capital; and, in general, avoid speculative investments. The BTI’s investment policy to invest assets in a manner that strives for maximum safety, provides adequate liquidity to meet all operating requirements, and achieves the highest possible investment return consistent with the primary objectives of safety and liquidity. The BTI recognizes that risk, volatility, and the possibility of loss in purchasing power are present to some degree in all types of investments. Due to the short-term nature of BTI’s Consolidated Fund, the BTI believes that it is imperative to review and adjust the investment policy in reaction to interest rate market fluctuations/trends on a regular basis and has adopted a formal review schedule. Investment policies have been established for each investment pool and account of the BTI’s Consolidated Fund. Of the BTI’s Consolidated Fund pools and accounts which the Commission may invest in, three are subject to credit risk: WV Money Market Pool, WV Government Money Market Pool, and WV Short Term Bond Pool.

WV Money Market Pool

Credit Risk — Credit risk is the risk that an issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. For the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, the WV Money Market Pool has been rated AAAm by Standard & Poor’s. A Fund rated “AAAm” has extremely strong capacity to maintain principal stability and to limit exposure to principal losses due to credit, market, and/or liquidity risks. “AAAm” is the highest principal stability fund rating assigned by Standard & Poor’s. As this pool has been rated, specific information on the credit ratings of the underlying investments of the pool have not been provided.

The BTI limits the exposure to credit risk in the WV Money Market Pool by requiring all corporate bonds to be rated AA- by Standard & Poor’s (or its equivalent) or higher. Commercial paper must be rated at least A-1 by Standard & Poor’s and P1 by Moody’s. The pool must have at least 15% of its assets in U.S. Treasury issues.

At June 30, 2009 and 2008, the WV Money Market Pool investments had a total carrying value of \$2,570,261,000 and \$2,358,470,000 respectively, of which the College’s ownership represents 0.18% and 0.25%, respectively.

NOTE 3 - CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS (Continued)

WV Government Money Market Pool

Credit Risk — For the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, the WV Government Market Pool has been rated AAAM by Standard & Poor's. A Fund rated "AAAM" has extremely strong capacity to maintain principal stability and to limit exposure to principal losses due to credit, market, and/or liquidity risks. "AAAM" is the highest principal stability fund rating assigned by Standard & Poor's. As this pool has been rated, specific information on the credit ratings of the underlying investments of the pool have not been provided.

The BTI limits the exposure to credit risk in the WV Government Money Market Pool by limiting the pool to U.S. Treasury issues, U.S. government agency issues, money market funds investing in U.S. Treasury issues and U.S. government agency issues, and repurchase agreements collateralized by U.S. Treasury issues and U.S. government agency issues. The pool must have at least 15% of its assets in U.S. Treasury issues.

At June 30, 2009 and 2008, the WV Government Money Market Pool investments had a total carrying value of \$283,826,000 and \$187,064,000, of which the College's ownership represents 0.01% and 0.03% respectively.

WV Short Term Bond Pool

Credit Risk — The BTI limits the exposure to credit risk in the WV Short Term Bond Pool by requiring all corporate bonds to be rated A by Standards & Poor's (or its equivalent) or higher. Commercial paper must be rated at least A-1 by Standards & Poor's and P1 by Moody's. Other Investment Risks — Other investment risks include concentration of credit risk, custodial credit risk, and foreign currency risk. None of the BTI's Consolidated Fund's investment pools or accounts is exposed to these risks as described below.

Concentration of credit risk is the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of the BTI's Consolidated Fund pool or account's investment in a single corporate issuer. The BTI investment policy prohibits those pools and accounts permitted to hold corporate securities from investing more than 5% of their assets in any one corporate name or one corporate issue.

The custodial credit risk for investments is the risk that, in the event of the failure of the counterparty to a transaction, the BTI will not be able to recover the value of investment or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. Repurchase agreements are required to be collateralized by at least 102% of their value, and the collateral is held in the name of the BTI. Securities lending collateral that is reported on the BTI's statement of fiduciary net assets is invested in the lending agent's money market fund in the BTI's name. In all transactions, the BTI or its agent does not release cash or securities until the counterparty delivers its side of the transaction.

Foreign currency risk is the risk that changes in exchange rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment or a deposit. None of the BTI's Consolidated Fund's investment pools or accounts holds interests in foreign currency or interests valued in foreign currency.

Deposits — Custodial credit risk of deposits is the risk that in the event of failure of a depository financial institution, a government will not be able to recover deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. Deposits include nonnegotiable certificates of deposit. None of the above pools contain nonnegotiable certificates of deposit. The BTI does not have a deposit policy for custodial credit risk.

The College maintains certain collections of inexhaustible assets to which no value can be practically determined. Accordingly, such collections are not capitalized or recognized for financial statement purposes. Such collections include contributed works of art, historical treasures, and literature that are held for exhibition, education, research, and public service. These collections are neither disposed of for financial gain nor encumbered in any means.

Title for certain real property is with the Commission.

At June 30, 2009, the College had outstanding contractual commitments of approximately \$208,000 for property, plant, and equipment expenditures.

NOTE 6 - INVESTMENTS

As of June 30, 2009 and 2008 respectively, investments had a combined carrying value of \$339,610 and \$423,279 of which \$174,854 and \$199,064 is invested with First Community Bank and \$164,756 and \$224,215 is invested with First Century Bank, respectively. Of the funds invested with First Community Bank, 4% is invested in Federal Government Bonds and 96% is invested in a money market fund, the underlying securities of which were securities of the U.S. Government. Of the funds invested with First Century Bank, 78% is invested in equities, 16% is invested in fixed income securities, 5% is invested in a money market fund, the underlying securities of which were securities of the Federated Prime Value Obligation Fund, and 1% is invested in limited partnerships.

The investments are held with a third-party trustee. The money market funds invest in U.S. Government Securities and Federated Prime Value Obligation Funds. These funds are rated AAA by Standard and Poor's. The U.S. Government Securities are also rated Aaa by Moody's. The Federal Government Bonds are rated AAA by Standard and Poor's and Aaa by Moody's. The fixed income securities invest in Federal Home Loan Bank Bonds, Freddie Mac Notes and certificates of deposit under the CDARS program. The equity market securities, fixed income securities and limited partnerships are rated AAA by Standard and Poor's. Management believes that there is no significant custodial credit risk nor interest rate risk for any of the funds. Furthermore, the funds are not exposed to any significant concentration of credit risk nor any foreign currency risk.

NOTE 8 - OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

With the adoption of GASB Statement No. 45 for the year ended June 30, 2008, OPEB costs are accrued based upon invoices received from PEIA based upon actuarial determined amounts. At June 30, 2009 and 2008, the noncurrent liability related to OPEB costs was \$440,355 and \$210,624, respectively. For the year ended June 30, 2008, the University recorded a cumulative effect of the adoption of this accounting principle of \$1,537,730, an amount equal to the June 30, 2007, liability for the extended health or life insurance benefit previously recorded in accordance with GASB Statement No. 16. The total of OPEB expense incurred and the amount of OPEB expense that relates to retirees was \$804,371 and \$382,296, respectively, during 2009 and \$1,021,506 and \$466,682, respectively, during 2008. As of the year ended June 30, 2009, there were 15 retirees receiving these benefits, respectively.

NOTE 9 - STATE SYSTEM OF HIGHER EDUCATION INDEBTEDNESS

The College is a State institution of higher education. It receives a State appropriation in partial support of its operations. In addition, the College is subject to the legislative and administrative mandates of State government. Those mandates affect all aspects of the College's operations, its tuition and fee structure, its personnel policies and its administrative practices.

The State has chartered the Commission with the responsibility to construct or renovate, finance and maintain various academic and other facilities of the State's universities and colleges, including certain facilities of the College. Financing for these facilities was provided through revenue bonds issued by the former Board of Regents or the former Boards of the College and College Systems (the "Boards"). These obligations administered by the Commission are the direct and total responsibility of the Commission, as successor to the former Boards.

The Commission assesses each public institution of higher education for funds to meet the payment of debt service on these various bonds. The tuition and registration fees of the members of the former State University System are generally pledged as collateral for the Commission's bond indebtedness. Student fees collected by the institution in excess of the debt service allocation are retained by the institution for internal funding of capital projects and maintenance. Although the bonds remain as a capital obligation of the Commission, an estimate of the obligation of each institution is reported as a long-term payable by each institution and as a receivable by the Commission. During 2009 and 2008, the College paid \$21,327 and \$20,561 to the Commission against the debt obligation. The amount due to Commission at June 30, 2009 is \$55,510.

During the year ended June 30, 2005, the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission issued \$167 million of 2004 series B Revenue Bonds (Higher Education Facilities) bonds. The College was approved for \$0.8 million of the bond proceeds for capital projects from this bond issuance. The capital project was the Bluefield campus ADA project. As of June 30, 2009, the College has drawn all of the available bond funds to pay for capital projects. State lottery funds will be used to repay the debt, although College revenues are pledged if lottery funds prove insufficient.

NOTE 11 - RETIREMENT PLANS

Substantially all full-time employees of the College participate in either the West Virginia Teachers' Retirement System (the "STRS") or the Teachers' Insurance and Annuities Association - College Retirement Equities Fund (the "TIAA-CREF"). Previously, upon full-time employment, all employees were required to make an irrevocable selection between the STRS and TIAA-CREF. Effective July 1, 1991, the STRS was closed to new participants. Current participants in the STRS are permitted to make a one-time election to cease their participation in that plan and commence contributions to the West Virginia Teachers' Defined Contribution Plan. Contributions to and participation in the West Virginia Teachers' Defined Contribution Plan by College employees have not been significant to date.

Effective January 1, 2003, higher education employees enrolled in the basic 401(a) retirement plan with TIAA-CREF have an option to switch to the new Educators Money 401(a) basic retirement plan. New hires have a choice of either plan. As of June 30, 2008, there were no employees enrolled in the new Educators Money 401(a) basic retirement plan.

The STRS is a cost sharing, multiple employer defined benefit public employee retirement system. Employer and employee contribution rates are established annually by the State Legislature. The contractual maximum contribution rate is 15%. The College accrued and paid its contribution to the STRS at the rate of 15% of each enrolled employee's total annual salary for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008. Required employee contributions were at the rate of 6% of total annual salary for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008. Participants in the STRS may retire with full benefits upon reaching age 60 with five years of service, age 55 with 30 years of service, or any age with 35 years of service. Lump-sum withdrawal of employee contributions is available upon termination of employment. Pension benefits are based upon 2% of final average salary (the highest five years' salaries out of the last 15 years) multiplied by the number of years of service.

Total contributions to the STRS for the years ended June 30, 2009, 2008 and 2007 were \$198,062, \$181,762 and \$181,636, which consisted of \$141,473, \$129,830 and \$129,737, from the College, and \$56,589, \$51,932, and \$51,899 from the covered employees in 2009, 2008 and 2007, respectively.

The contribution rate is set by the State Legislature on an overall basis and the STRS does not perform a calculation of the contribution requirement for individual employers, such as the College. Historical trend and net pension obligation information is available from the annual financial report of the Consolidated Public Retirement Board. A copy of the report may be obtained by writing to the Consolidated Public Retirement Board, Building 5, Room 1000, Charleston, WV 25305.

The TIAA-CREF is a defined contribution benefit plan in which benefits are based solely upon amounts contributed plus investment earnings. Employees who elect to participate in this plan are required to make a contribution equal to 6% of total annual compensation. The College matches the employees' 6% contribution. Contributions are immediately and fully vested. In addition, employees may elect to make additional contributions to TIAA-CREF which are not matched by the College.

Total contributions to the TIAA-CREF for the years ended June 30, 2009, 2008 and 2007 were \$1,068,704, \$1,038,522 and \$1,006,016 which consisted of equal contributions of \$534,352, \$519,261, and \$503,008, respectively, from both the College and covered employees.

The Great West benefit program is also available to new employees. Total contributions to the Great West for year ended June 30, 2009 and 2008 were \$18,970 and \$17,034, which consisted of equal contributions \$9,485 and \$8,517, respectively, from both College and employees.

The College's total payroll for the years ended June 30, 2009, 2008 and 2007 was \$11,417,684, \$10,817,817, and \$10,231,245. Total covered employees' salaries in the STRS and TIAA-CREF and Great West were \$943,155, \$8,905,890, and \$158,090, respectively, in 2009; \$865,532, \$8,654,350, and \$141,950, respectively in 2008; and \$864,906, \$8,353,466, and \$96,444, respectively in 2007.

NOTE 12 - LEASES

The College leases a branch campus facility in the State. Rental payments for this facility were \$138,047 for the year end June 30, 2009. Following is a schedule of future minimum lease payments for the term of this operating lease.

NOTE 13 - DISCRETELY PRESENTED COMPONENT UNITS

The Bluefield State College Foundation, Incorporated (the "Foundation") is a separate nonprofit organization incorporated in the State of West Virginia and has as its purpose "...to aid, strengthen and further in every proper and useful way, the work and services of the College and its affiliated nonprofit organizations..." Oversight of the Foundation is the responsibility of a separate and independently elected Board of Directors, not otherwise affiliated with the College. In carrying out its responsibilities, the Board of Directors of the Foundation employs management, forms policy and maintains fiscal accountability over funds administered by the Foundation. Although the College does not control the timing or amount of receipts from the Foundation, the majority of resources, or income thereon, that the Foundation holds and invests are restricted to the activities of the College by the donors. Because these restricted resources held by the Foundation can only be used by, or for the benefit of, the College, the Foundation is considered a component unit of the College and is therefore discretely presented with the College's financial statements in accordance with GASB Statement No. 39. Complete financial statements for the Foundation can be obtained from the President of the Bluefield State College Foundation at College Avenue, Bluefield, Virginia 24605.

The Bluefield State College Research and Development Corporation (the "Corporation") is a separate nonprofit organization incorporated in the State of West Virginia and has as its purpose "...form partnerships and develop commitments for assistance from a wide spectrum of community based organizations in both the public and private sectors. The corporation will work to identify and eliminate barriers that inhibit access to technology training and market based development activities in communities served by the College..." Oversight of the Corporation is the responsibility of a separate and independently elected Board of Directors, not otherwise affiliated with the College. In carrying out its responsibilities, the Board of Directors of the Corporation employs management, forms policy and maintains fiscal accountability over funds administered by the Corporation. Although the College does not control the timing or amount of receipts from the Corporation, the majority of resources, or income thereon, that the Corporation holds and invests are restricted to the activities of the College by donors or grant restrictions. Because these restricted resources held by the Corporation can only be used by, or for the benefit of, the College, the Corporation can only be used by, or for the benefit of, the College, the Corporation is considered a component unit of the College and is therefore discretely presented with the College's financial statements in accordance with GASB Statement No. 39. Complete financial statements for the Corporation can be obtained from the President of the Bluefield State College Research and Development Corporation at 704 Bland Street, Bluefield, Virginia 24605.

During the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, the Foundation contributed \$243,222, and \$269,860 to the College for scholarships and grants and employee compensation.

NOTE 14 - AFFILIATED ORGANIZATIONS (UNAUDITED)

The College has separately incorporated affiliated organizations including the Center for Applied Research and Technology of Bluefield State College and the Bluefield State College Alumni Association. Oversight responsibility for these entities rests with independent boards and management not otherwise affiliated with the College. Accordingly, the financial statements of these organizations are not included in the College's accompanying financial statements under GASB Statement No. 14, and they are not included in the College's accompanying financial statements under GASB Statement No. 39 because they are not significant.

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NOTE 15 - CONTINGENCIES

The nature of the educational industry is such that, from time to time, claims will be presented against colleges on account of alleged negligence, acts of discrimination, breach of contract or disagreements arising from the interpretation of laws or regulations. While some of these claims may be for substantial amounts, they are not unusual in the ordinary course of providing educational services in a higher education system. In the opinion of management, all known claims are covered by insurance or are such that an award against the College would not seriously impact the financial position of the College.

Under the terms of federal grants, periodic audits are required and certain costs may be questioned as not being appropriate expenditures under the terms of the grants. Such audits could lead to reimbursement to the grantor agencies. The College's management believes disallowances, if any, will not have a significant financial impact on the College's financial position.

The College owns various buildings which are known to contain asbestos. The College is not required by Federal, state or local law to remove the asbestos from its buildings. The College is required under Federal Environmental, Health and Safety Regulations to manage the presence of asbestos in its buildings in a safe condition. The College addresses its responsibility to manage the presence of asbestos in its buildings on a case by case basis. Significant problems of dangerous asbestos conditions are abated as the condition becomes known. The College also addresses the presence of asbestos as building renovation or demolition projects are undertaken and through asbestos operation and maintenance programs directed at containing, managing or operating with the asbestos in a safe condition.

Note 1. **Significant Accounting Policies and Other Matters**

Nature of Foundation:

Bluefield State College Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") is incorporated as a non-profit corporation under the laws of the State of West Virginia. The purpose of the Foundation is to provide for student scholarships and faculty and staff development at Bluefield State College (the "College").

The Foundation is managed by an independently elected Board of Directors not otherwise affiliated with the College. All contributions generally are for the benefit of the College and are administered by the Foundation.

Basis of accounting:

The financial statements of the Foundation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.

The accompanying financial statements present information regarding the Foundation's financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted and permanently restricted. The three classes are differentiated based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions, as described below:

Unrestricted net assets are free of donor-imposed restrictions. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees or may otherwise be limited by contractual agreements with outside parties. Expenses, revenues, gains and losses that are not temporarily or permanently restricted by donors are included in this classification.

Temporarily restricted net assets are limited in use by donor-imposed stipulations that expire either by the passage of time or that can be fulfilled by action of the Foundation pursuant to those stipulations.

Permanently restricted net assets are amounts required by donors to be held in perpetuity; however, the income on these assets is available to meet various restricted and other operating needs. These net assets primarily include permanent endowment funds and funds held in trust by others.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Contributions:

Contributions received, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions in the period received.

Conditional promises to give are not recognized until they become unconditional, that is when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met. Contributions of assets other than cash are recorded at their estimated fair value.

Contributions are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets unless use of the related assets is limited by donor imposed restrictions. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the Statements of Activities as net assets released from restrictions.

The Foundation occasionally utilizes office space located in a college owned building and receives assistance in development and administration of the Foundation by an employee of the College.

The value of these services as well as other donated volunteer services are not reflected in the accompanying financial statements since there is no objective basis available by which to measure the value of such services.

Cash and short-term investments:

The Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash and cash equivalents.

The money market investment accounts are approximately \$860,569 and \$815,361 for June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively, and the principal underlying assets are securities of the U.S. Government, its agencies, authorities and instrumentality's and obligations of U.S. banks. The estimated fair value of short-term investments approximates cost. Cash held for long-term investment is classified as investment.

Contributions receivable:

Unconditional promises are recognized as revenue in the period received and as assets, decreases of liabilities, or expenses depending on the form of the benefits received. Promises are recorded at net realizable value if they are expected to be collected in one year and at fair value if they are expected to be collected in more than one year. Conditional promises are recognized when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met.

Investments:

Investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the Statements of Financial Position. Net unrealized and realized gains or losses are reflected in the Statements of Activities. Certain land and other investments, which are not readily marketable, are carried at cost.

Gifts of investments are recorded at their fair value (based on quotations or appraisals) at date of gift. Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on the trade date.

Income and realized and unrealized net gains on investments of endowment and similar net asset classes are reported as follows:

- As increases in permanently restricted net assets if the terms of the gift require that they be added to the principal of a permanent endowment fund;
- As increases in temporarily restricted net assets if the terms of the gift impose restrictions on the use of the income;
- As increases in unrestricted net assets in all other cases.

Amounts held on behalf of others:

Amounts held on behalf of others are used to account for assets held by the Foundation as an agent. These funds are custodial by nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of operations.

Income tax status:

The Foundation is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, when applicable, any income from certain activities not directly related to the Foundation's tax-exempt purpose would be subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Foundation qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2).

Credit risk concentration:

Financial instruments, which potentially subject the Foundation to concentrations of credit risk, consist principally of cash and cash equivalents and investments. The Foundation places its temporary cash investments with high credit quality financial institutions and does not believe it is exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents. Concentration of credit risk for investments is limited by the Foundation's policy of diversification of investments.

Reclassifications:

Certain accounts in the prior year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform with the presentation in the current year financial statements.

Note 7. **Fair Value Measurements**

Effective January 1, 2008, the Foundation adopted the provisions of SFAS No. 157, "Fair Value Measurements," ("SFAS 157") for financial assets and financial liabilities. In accordance with FASB Staff Position No. 157-2, "Effective Date of FASB Statement No. 157," the Foundation will delay application of FASB 157 for non-financial assets and non-financial liabilities until January 1, 2009. Level 1 Inputs – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date.

Level 2 Inputs – Inputs other than quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These might include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, such as interest rates, volatilities, prepayment speeds, and credit risks, or inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by market data by correlation or other means.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

NATURE OF ACTIVITIES - Bluefield State College Research & Development Corporation (the "Corporation"), is organized for the purpose of operating a non-profit organization exclusively for charitable, educational and scientific purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In 2008, the Corporation purchased a college dormitory facility to house students. Revenues are derived from federal, state or private sources in the form of grants. The majority of revenues are derived from office space rent to start-up businesses and dormitory rooms rented to students.

The Corporation provides most of its resources for the benefit of Bluefield State College. Furthermore, because of the relationship with Bluefield State College the Corporation is considered a discretely presented component unit of the Bluefield State College.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING - The financial statements of the Corporation have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION - Financial statement presentation follows the requirements of the Financial Accounting Standards Board and report using accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Corporation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

USE OF ESTIMATES - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS - For purposes of the statements of cash flows, the Corporation considers all highly liquid investments available for current use with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. Cash restricted for funds held for others was \$65,869 and \$62,662 for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

The Corporation maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Corporation has not experienced any losses in such accounts. The Corporation believes that the bank is credit worthy and that it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash and cash equivalents.

RECEIVABLES - The Corporation has receivables from grants, other State Agencies and also leases office space to businesses and dormitory rooms to students based on contractual agreements. Receivables are stated at face amount with an allowance for doubtful accounts, based on historical collection experience, and an evaluation of the accounts receivables are deemed delinquent based on billing due dates or other contractual terms, with no interest accrued. Accounts delinquent greater than ninety (90) days totaled \$8,704 and \$9,959 as of June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively. When accounts are deemed uncollectible, they are charged against the allowance. Bad debt expense for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008 was \$8,625 and \$9,000, respectively.

INVENTORIES – Inventories consisting of food items are stated at the lower of cost or market, with cost determined primarily on the first-in, first-out method.

FUNDS HELD FOR OTHERS - Funds held for others are used to account for assets held by the Corporation as an agent. These funds are custodial by nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of operations.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT - Property and equipment are stated at cost at the date of acquisition or fair value at the date of the gift, less accumulated depreciation. Additions, improvements and expenditures that materially improve or extend the life of an asset are capitalized. For the Federal programs the Corporation utilizes the federal threshold for capitalization which is \$5,000. All other activities of the Corporation capitalize fixed assets with a cost greater than \$1,000. Maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Upon retirement or sale of an asset, its cost and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the property accounts. Depreciation is calculated on the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the depreciable assets.

INTANGIBLES - As part of the dormitory facility purchase in 2008, the Corporation has recorded a covenant not to compete, amortized over the life of the agreement, and facility start up costs, amortized over 15 years, in the amount of \$111,042. Amortization for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008 was \$12,828 and \$4,276, respectively.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE AND ACCRUED EXPENSES - Accounts payable and accrued expenses consist primarily of expenses incurred for the operation of the Mountain View Dormitory and related payroll liabilities. Related party payables due to Bluefield State College as of the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008 were \$27,662 and \$34,132, respectively.

DEFERRED REVENUE - Deferred revenue consists of grants that have been received for a specific purpose, but have not yet met revenue recognition criteria.

UNRESTRICTED NET ASSETS - The unrestricted category consists of funds whose use is limited only to the extent that the Corporation's bylaws limit the activities of the organization. Contributions with donor-imposed restrictions met in the same year in which the contribution is recognized are reported as changes in unrestricted net assets.

TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS - Temporarily restricted net assets are comprised of funds whose use has been limited by donors to a specific time period and/or purpose. At year end, the entire balance of temporarily restricted net assets is comprised of property and equipment restricted to the use of certain federal grant programs. The Corporation currently has no temporarily restricted net assets.

PERMANENTLY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS - Permanently restricted net assets are comprised of funds whose use have been restricted by the donor and must be maintained permanently by the Corporation. The Corporation currently has no permanently restricted net assets.

SUPPORT AND REVENUE - Support received under conditional contracts and grants are reported as deferred revenue until qualifying expenses have been incurred or other conditions have been substantially met. Contracts and grants receivable represent amounts expected to be received after year-end on approved grants. Deferred revenue represents amounts received or receivable in advance of incurring the related expenditures. Cash received but not yet expended for these contracts is restricted to the purposes of the contribution or contract.

CONTRIBUTED SERVICES, SUPPLIES, AND SPACE - Contributions of services are recognized if the services received create or enhance nonfinancial assets, or require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. Contributed services and promises to give services that do not meet the above criteria are not recognized. Contributed services that are recognized are valued at the estimated cost that would have been incurred by the Corporation to purchase similar services. Donated space is valued at the estimated fair rental value. Donations of occupancy costs and other non-inventory items are expensed during the year the contributions are provided.

FUNCTIONAL REPORTING - Expenses are reported on a functional basis that discloses the purposes for which the expenses have been incurred. A brief description of each of the functional classifications is as follows:

- **Program Services** - Represent funds expended primarily to provide support for certain federal, state and private research and development programs.
- **Management and General** - Represent expenses incurred principally for (1) executive level activities concerned with management of the operations, (2) legal and fiscal operations, and (3) other administrative related expenses.
- **Fundraising** - Represents expenses related to community and other development costs expended to perform fundraising for the Corporation. The Corporation had no fundraising expenditures for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008.

CONCENTRATIONS - Approximately 7% and 0% of the Corporation's support was provided by grants from the Federal Government for the years ended June 30, 2009 and 2008, respectively.

INCOME TAX STATUS - The Corporation is exempt from federal income tax on its exempt purpose activities as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

RECLASSIFICATIONS - Certain amounts in the 2008 financial statements have been reclassified to conform with current year presentation. Such reclassifications had no effect on net assets or the change in net assets.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH
GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

We have audited the financial statements of Bluefield State College (the "College") as of and for the year ended June 30, 2009, and have issued our report thereon dated October 26, 2009, which states reliance on other auditors for the discretely presented component units. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. The financial statements of the Bluefield State College Foundation, Inc. were not audited in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the College's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control over financial reporting.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the College's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

We noted certain matters that we have reported to management of the College in a separate letter dated October 26, 2009.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the College's management, the Members of the College's Governing Board, the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission, federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than those specified parties.
